The season of Lent leads up to the most holy of Christian days, Easter Sunday. The forty days of Lent begin Ash Wednesday and end at dusk the Saturday before Easter, not counting the Sundays in between. The Sundays during Lent, like every Sunday, are considered weekly celebrations of the resurrection. Many denominations encourage disciples to renew and strengthen their faith during Lent. Plans are made for community-wide Lenten preparation through the spiritual disciplines of prayer, Bible study, fasting, and service.

This preparation is a historical model from the early church. New believers were mentored in the Christian faith weeks before Easter, preparing for their baptisms at the Great Easter Vigil. The idea of giving something up for Lent came out of this tradition, when fasting—abstaining from food as an act of discipline in solidarity with others in the community—was used to raise one's spiritual consciousness and empty oneself before God. Fasting or giving up something for Lent can be a good way to explore a deeper expression of faith, if not adopted as a show of piety, martyrdom, or moral righteousness. Presbyterians may find it meaningful to give something up for Lent, but it is not required. Some disciples may find a more valuable spiritual exercise in taking something on during Lent—a more Christ-like attitude toward others, a humble spirit at work, or a feeling of gratitude in the midst of scarcity. Whatever spiritual disciplines and preparations are embraced during Lent, they can help us prepare for or renew our baptisms as part of the resurrection celebration at Easter.

HISTORY OF HARMONY METHODIST CHURCH AND CEMETERY

One of the first sites we noticed upon moving into this area was the historic "Harmony Methodist Church and Cemetery." The Harmony Church on Harmony Rd. off County Line Rd. was built in 1833 with a fine gracious steeple and stained-glass windows. Particularly outstanding on the church building are the stained-glass windows: some are dedicated to Cornelius Matthews and family.

The church has a quaint old world quality. One can almost picture the horse and buggies as well as the farm wagons pulling up to the church on a Sunday. We can also visualize the women stepping down, in their lovely bonnets and church day finery.

Unfortunately, the church is closed and in disrepair as is much of the cemetery. However, I did notice that the newer grave sites are well tended. These new sites appear to be where many of the recently deceased descendants are interred.

The Harmony Methodist Church cemetery contains the graves of many of the prominent founding families of Jackson. According to the only manual or history available on Jackson Township: "Cranberries, Coups and Courts" (written in 1999 by the Jackson Memorial H.S. Seniors) one can easily trace the local history by checking out the old tombstones in each of the cemeteries.

The earliest Jackson settlers were given permission to purchase Lenape land by the English colonial Governor Nicholls. This document was called the Monmouth Patent of 1665. The Patent was drawn under the authority of the Duke of York. In future articles we will go into the 17th century history of the settlers and the Lenape Native Americans. Many of the descendants of the earliest settlers are buried in the Harmony Cemetery. The settlers in the 18th century had family names such as Jackson, Applegate, Allen, Child, Hankinson, Hendrick, Bennet, De Bow and Cottrel. The latter all left their footprints on this community.

How many times have we driven on Bennetts Mills Rd. or read something about the De Bow Methodist Church. Applegate Rd., here in Jackson, is another foot print of the original settlers.

I did meet Katherine De Bow at a presentation by the historical society. She was still going strong in her late 90's back in 2005.

Other burial plots at Harmony are of those families who have left behind some indelible marks. The names include Thompson, Clayton, Hankins, Johnson and Holman.

A resident of Jackson might recognize the name Thompson from Thompson Bridge Rd. The earliest known

burial of a Thompson was in 1856 in the Harmony Rd. cemetery. The Thompsons, with 122 family grave sites, are represented in each of the cemeteries. Unfortunately, the latter was an indication of a sickness or tragedy that moved through the family, killing most of them within a short period of time. Fifty-four Thompsons are interred in the Harmony Cemetery.

The Clayton family name is very well known in Jackson. Joseph E. Clayton, the educator, gave his name to the Clayton Building at the high school. The Clayton building was originally Jackson's first middle school. I noticed that the Clayton family name was heavily concentrated in the Harmony Rd. Cemetery. "Of their total number of 82 graves, 65 Claytons are interred at the Harmony site." And what did I notice the other day here in South Knolls? The Clayton Cement Trucks; the Claytons continue to play a part in the foundation of Jackson (slight pun intended).

The Holmans are another prominent Jackson family. Some are buried at The Harmony site. The brothers Holman came from Scotland to found Holmansville around 1705. The family was involved in lumbering and the charcoal industry and eventually in the mid-19th century formed the C & J Cranberry Co. We have all heard of the Lucy N. Holman elementary school.

The family name Matthews has at least 85 of 87 members buried at the Harmony Rd. Cemetery. The earliest burial was Fostina W. in 1862. The more recent internments were in 1992 two by the name of James E. (41 yrs. old) and Lillian (94 yrs old). There could now be additional family plots. The latter dates were those available to us via the booklet written in 1999.

Five of the Johnson family, are buried in the Harmony Cemetery. Ten of the family members are buried in the Pleasant Grove Cemetery. The largest concentration of the Johnson family are interred at the Holmansville cemetery. And five are buried in the Harmony cemetery. The last member of the family to be buried at Harmony was Janice M. in 1995. The first one was Job in 1913.

The Hankins/Applegate family, related by marriage, have been in this area since 1667. The two families along with the Cook family came here from England. Ten are buried in the Harmony cemetery.

Two of the most prominent members of the Hankins family are buried right here at the little plot in South Knolls. Zakariah Hankins stone is inscribed: ZAKARIAH HANKINS 1754- 1850 - NEW JERSEY MILITIA. Zakariah's wife Phebe died in 1831. Phebe's stone was very hard to decipher, so I don't have her birth date.

I had the pleasure of meeting, Sharleen Leischker, the great, great, etc., granddaughter of Zakariah. And I had the pleasure of meeting William Hankins, a cousin to Sharleen and a descendent of the Hankins family. Sharleen lives right here in South Knolls and William lives in the area. William was helpful in compiling some of this history.

Every stone in the cemetery tells a story and a history of Jackson. "It is almost a way to say, "I existed! I was once alive". I walked up and down each and every gravesite and thought I heard the following question (at least in my head): Is it possible for Jackson to ever restore "The Harmony Methodist Church and Cemetery" to its' original dignity.

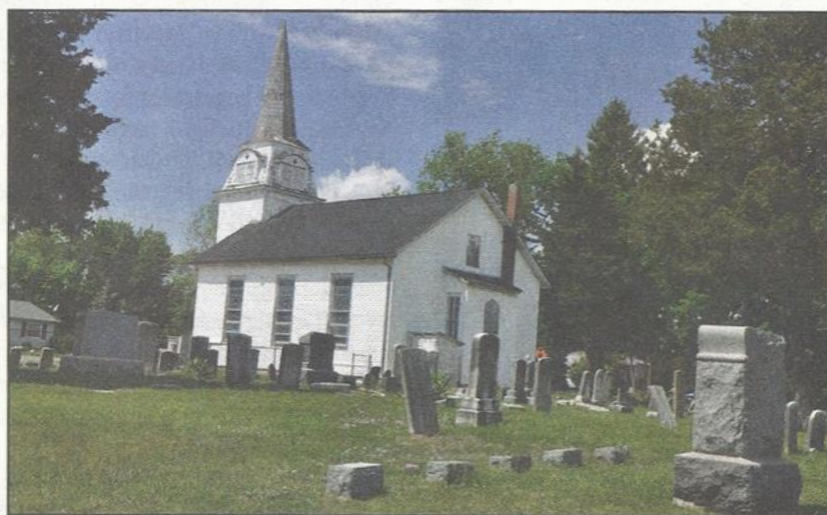
ADDENDUM: January 20, 2015

April 5th (Easter)—Reverend Victoria Pruner

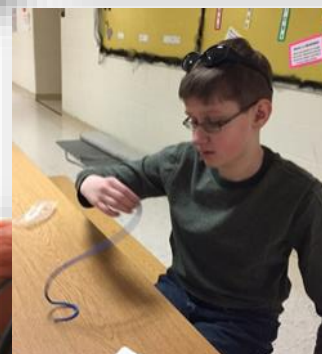

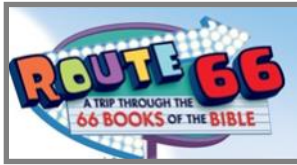

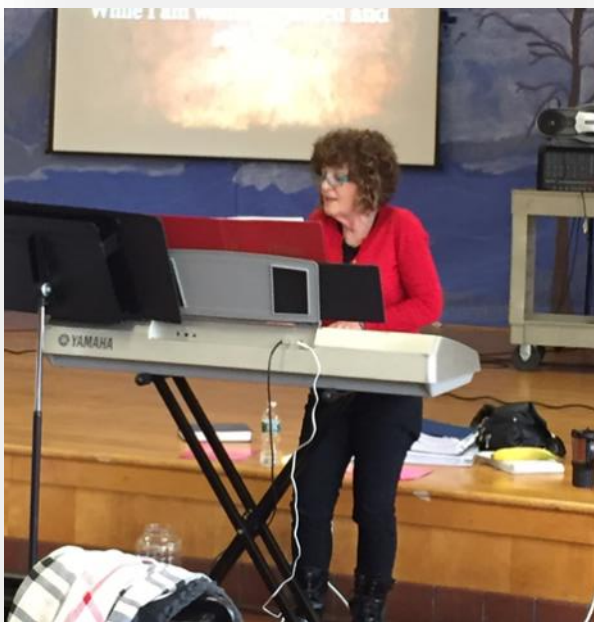

A note from Liz Heinzl-Nelson about their recent trip to Malawi. Please consider joining our team for the VIP Water Walk on May 8th! Information is on the previous page.

Dear Elizabeth,

Thanks for your prayers and concerns. Please pass on our gratitude to the congregation of Cornerstone for keeping us all in your thoughts and prayers. It really moves me when I know there are others praying for our brothers and sisters in Malawi. It encourages and inspires me.

The rain and winds have been very destructive to the villages. Climate change is real and being experienced in powerful ways in sub-sahara Africa! The people in the villages who had so little to begin with, have lost so much with these constant rains and high winds. Roofs have blown off, sides of houses have collapsed under the constant beating of rain and high winds, trees have been torn apart crushing houses, crops are destroyed yielding nothing! The old people say there have never been winds associated with the rainy season. They have never experienced anything like this.

As we drove into Sakata one afternoon to survey the damage done, a wind storm suddenly descended on us. We came upon this scene. The family whose house had just been destroyed by high winds and rain stand under the shelter of their mother's house and look on at their house destroyed. Fortunately no one was injured!



These pictures show crops seen in many villages, ruined from the floods, still standing in water. The yellowish leaves reveal lack of nutrients which have all been washed away. There will be little or no yields from many of the crops this year.

Emergency Recovery Strategies:

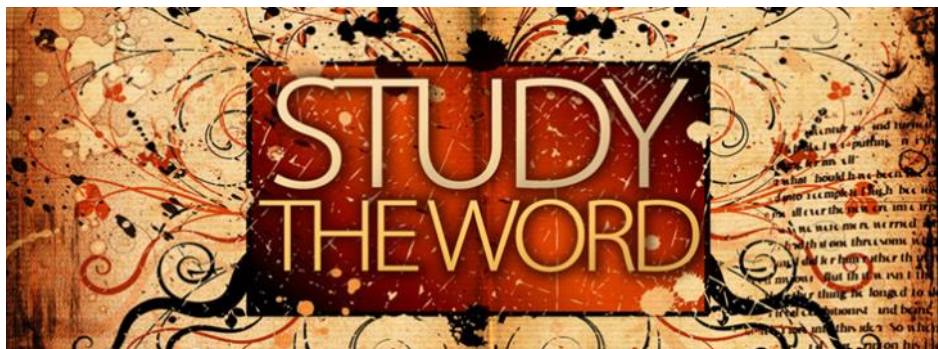
- \$13 provides 2 families with a roll of plastic for recovery roofing to go under thatch grasses.
- \$40 provides one family with sweet potato vines, ground nut seeds or an alternative crop + fertilizer
- \$330 will provide one village with tree seedlings, watering cans and training to promote reforestation and prevent erosion.
- \$400 will provide 15 families from one village with a treadle pump, seed and fertilizer to plant irrigation crops during the dry season.

These recommendations come from our partners on the ground. This gives you an idea of how funds will be utilized. We are grateful for your partnership! May God bless you and your congregation!

ADULT BIBLE STUDY—Monday Evenings 6:30–8:00 PM

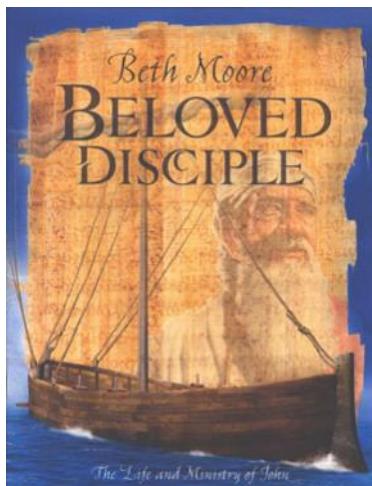
