A Message from Pastor Tory

In life, there are songs that stay with you. We can remember the words years after they were a hit. One of those songs for me is the song by Whitney Houston, "Greatest Love of All." The lyrics declare that "children are the future." Those words have always bothered me. Many knowing my commitment to children's ministry have told me how great it is that I have invested in the future of the church, "for children are the future" after all. The people mean well, yet for me, to say that children are the future, is to say they are nothing in the present. Long ago that is exactly what the disciples thought when children were brought to Jesus to be blessed. Mark 10:13-15 says "And parents were bringing children to him, that he might touch them; and the disciples rebuked them. But when Jesus saw it he was indignant, and said to them, 'Let the children come to me, do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of God. Truly, I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it.' And he took them in his arms and blessed them, laying his hands upon them." Jesus made it clear then and to us now. He says, "do not hinder them; for to such belongs the kingdom of God." Children and youth are part of the family of faith, their presence brings to the church something that no one else can bring. Children and youth often lead the way. How often I have heard parents tell how their youth/child lead them into the church. Or how often has a child's reply during the children's message bring you greater insight than the sermon. I believe we underestimate the importance of every individual in the church and that includes all from the very youngest to the oldest.

On July 7-10th, a representative group of our youth traveled to Roanoke, VA to serve as our missionaries with Group Workcamp. During the weekend, I witnessed again just how vital our youth are to the ministry and mission here at Cornerstone. The weekend started by leaving at 6:00am, arriving at the middle school to settle into the classroom assigned, get some dinner, worship together, get work assignments and then off to sleep on the floor. (continued from previous page) The mornings began at 6:30am, off to breakfast, morning worship and then pack into vans at 8:00am to the worksite until 4:00pm. The youth worked hard on their assignments. Some helped rip apart dangerous decking others were involved installing a new deck. Then others scraped, painted and stained decks and installed handicap equipment. A wheelchair ramp was put in and walls that were badly stained were cleaned and prepared for painting. Jobs done by youth were never ever tried at home, but they were experts when they arrived home. Service is just one part of the mission trip. The other part is to witness God's love by taking time with the people the youth were helping. To invite them to join in lunch and devotionals. The work was done for residents who were struggling. For example, one woman had just had serious back surgery and was barely able to walk, another woman had suffered a stroke at 45 and recently her husband died. People who had things covered until "life happened" and now they needed help. So many of the residents asked our youth, "Why would you come to help me? Are you being paid to do this work? No, then why are you helping me?" How wonderful to hear youth say, "We are here because that is what our Church does, we help people, that is what God wants us to do." Wow, how can anyone say youth are the future of the church and its mission!

The finally part of the mission is to come together with other Christian youth, to have time together in worship, fellowship and recreation. Our own Kayla Moyer said it best, "The youth we met were different than the kids in school. They weren't mean to each other. They were...like us...and we made new friends and we shared our numbers and are still in touch with each other." Our youth learned what takes many a life time to discover that there is precious gift to be found in Christian friendship.

There were so many highlights for me personally. The excitement on the face of each of our youth as they returned from a long day's work. Not a grumble, complaint, (maybe only to race for a shower after the long day in the heat) nor a note of discouragement. The outstanding way our leaders, Vikki Leach, Ally Moyer, Elizabeth Hughes, and Jim Pruner, guided and supported our youth. And I will always treasure the beautiful prayer that Ashley gave at the close of our last devotional time, no preacher could have prayed anymore beautifully and faithfully. Our youth, Jackie Leach, Ashley Moyer, Ben Leach, Dyana LaCross, Kayla Moyer and Jonathan Hughes, were committed 150 percent during the entire trip. Harmony Road Update from Bruce Thompson



On Wednesday, 7/19, we met with the Zoning Board and received final approval for what needs to be done. Now we have to get the proper permits from the Zoning and Building Departments to finish the project. A listing of remaining tasks are as follows (1-8) as well as some projects that are completed.

- 1) Finish the handicap ramp.
- 2) Pave the handicap parking area.
- 3) Put gravel in the parking lot on the north side of the church.
- 4) Install a guard rail between the porch and the road.
- 5) We were able to get a waiver on installing a curb and sidewalk until we build a meeting hall on the far north of the property. This will be done once we are able to

sell the property we own on Route 571.

- 6) By receiving the waiver, we saved enough that after we get a "Certificate of Occupancy", we will be able to address the issue of fixing the front porch to make it more attractive.
- 7) Remove and replace the handicap ramp at the front of the church with steps.
- 8) Finish framing the front door and finish painting where necessary.
- 9) On July 22nd, Dave LaCross and I went to the Salem Methodist church and were able to obtain a pulpit and baptismal font that fits in perfectly as well as some attractive offertory plates.
- 10) Cushions for the pews have been donated and are in the church.
- 11) Gail Carson has donated a very cute set of animal furniture (includes a table and 4 chairs) for the kids.
- 12) Several weeks ago, we received a communion table from the Englishtown Presbyterian Church.
- 13) The floors have been refinished and carpeting has been installed.
- 14) The stained glass window behind the altar has been repaired and replaced. It is spectacular!

BEACH BIBLE STUDY IN OCEAN GROVE—TUESDAYS IN JULY








The Cornerstone Choir rehearses before worship on Sundays at 9:00 AM.


